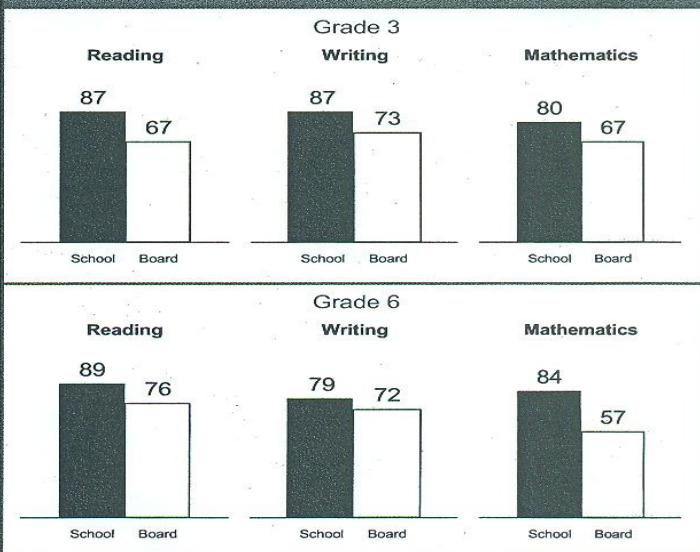

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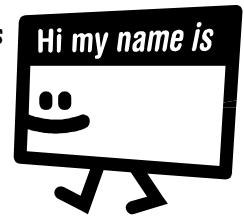

School Visitors ...

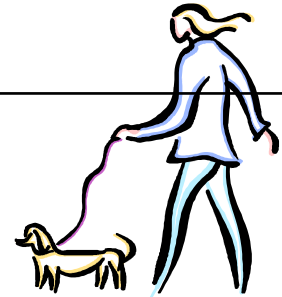
If you need to drop off something for your child or if you would like to meet with your child's teacher, please see Ms. Izzo in the office to leave items or to establish an appointment time with the teacher.

Behaviour Problems in Children and Adolescents

"Nobody's perfect and all children have bouts of bad behaviour. They may have temper tantrums, or talk back to their parents or teachers. When things start to get out of hand, however, it may be a clue that something in the child's or teen's life needs attention".

Children misbehave for a wide variety of reasons. Life events such as divorce, death, financial stress, or bullying can put a tremendous amount of stress on a child. Children need reassurance and extra care to help them through these stressful times.

Misbehaviour can also be a sign of other things such as childhood depression, A.D.H.D., or Conduct Disorders. In cases like these, medical attention is necessary.

Good communication with your child's school is also important. Teachers can pay extra attention to a child if they know the child is experiencing an especially difficult time. Do not hesitate to speak to your child's teacher.

If problems persist for long and are starting to interfere with your child's relationships or grades, don't hesitate to go for help. Each school has a Youth Counsellor and they can provide support for your child at school.

Head Lice ...

Head lice continues to be a problem, especially in school-aged children. Anyone can get head lice. It has nothing to do with whether you have clean or dirty hair, or the cleanliness of your home. Head lice mainly spread by head to head contact. Head lice can spread at school and during after school activities. This can be a frustrating year-long problem, unless we have everyone's co-operation to eliminate them properly.

Whose job is it anyway?

Head lice control works best when everyone co-operates. Parents, schools, students and Public Health Nurses all have a part to play in controlling this on going problem.

Role of Parents

- become educated regarding head lice; aware of symptoms which indicate head lice problem, able to identify head lice and eggs
- examine child's head regularly for head lice, e.g. once a week as part of regular hygiene routine
- notify school if child has head lice
- check all family members
- carry out treatment immediately, accurately and completely for all family members with head lice
- clean home, e.g. wash clothing, bedding and vacuum
- accompany child to school for readmission; notify principal that proper and full treatment has taken place
- take child home again and continue treatment if head lice/nits found on re-check
- consider participation as a volunteer parent at school for head lice prevention and control

Literacy ...

LINKING THROUGH LITERACY

Nonfiction Reading: How Families Can Help

Literacy development requires a partnership between home, school and community. Since nonfiction text is one of the most effective tools for developing reading skills, it is essential that children have ample opportunities at school, in the community, and at home to read a variety of nonfiction.

When reading nonfiction texts, what are some ways families can build literacy skills?

Tip #1 Help your child understand what he or she reads using comprehension strategies such as:

- asking questions while reading to help your child provide detail and to organize thoughts
- determining important points from interesting details
- making connections to things he or she already knows
- reading "between the lines" and
- discovering meaning that is not stated outright

Tip #2 Talk with your child by:

- having your child retell the main parts of the text
- encouraging him or her to express and justify opinions and
- showing interest in what your child is saying by being a good listener

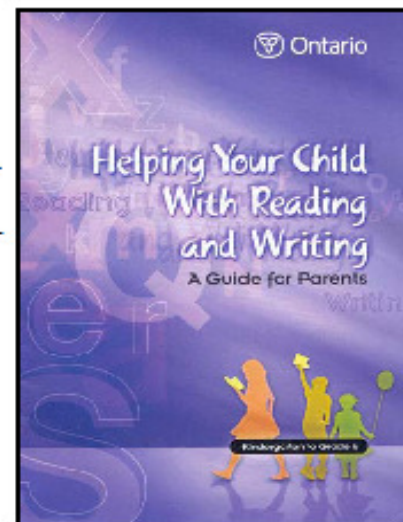
Tip #3 Make reading enjoyable by:

- making sure that you have a variety of books, magazines and other non-fiction reading materials on hand and
- browsing together in libraries and book stores looking at the graphic features in reading materials (e.g., photos, illustrations and charts) and identifying how they are used and what their purposes are

Many children like to read materials such as:

- stories that reflect their image of themselves
- articles about their heroes
- information on science and nature
- song lyrics or scripts that appeal to their musical and artistic tastes
- newspapers and magazines
- materials with both print and pictures (e.g., baseball cards)
- things they can read with others (e.g., game scores)
- books or articles that contain powerful ideas about our world

Public Health Department Info ...

Halloween Safety

Some pointers to keep the trick or treaters safe.

- Children under nine years of age should go out with an adult or responsible older child.
- Be sure your child stops at all curbs, looks left, right and left again to check for traffic. Remind children to cross at crosswalks, street corners or intersections. It is important they walk on the sidewalk, or walk facing the traffic if there is no sidewalk.
- Bright coloured costumes make your child easier to see. You can use reflective tape on a costume to make your child more visible. Face paint instead of a mask helps them to see well. Have your child carry a flashlight.
- When they get home, check all of their treats carefully. Throw out any treats that aren't wrapped, if the wrapping is torn or loose, or if the wrapper has a hole. Remember that small treats can cause your child to choke.
- You might want to offer an alternative to sugar based treats. Stickers or multicoloured pencils can be a nice surprise in place of, or in addition to, traditional treats.
